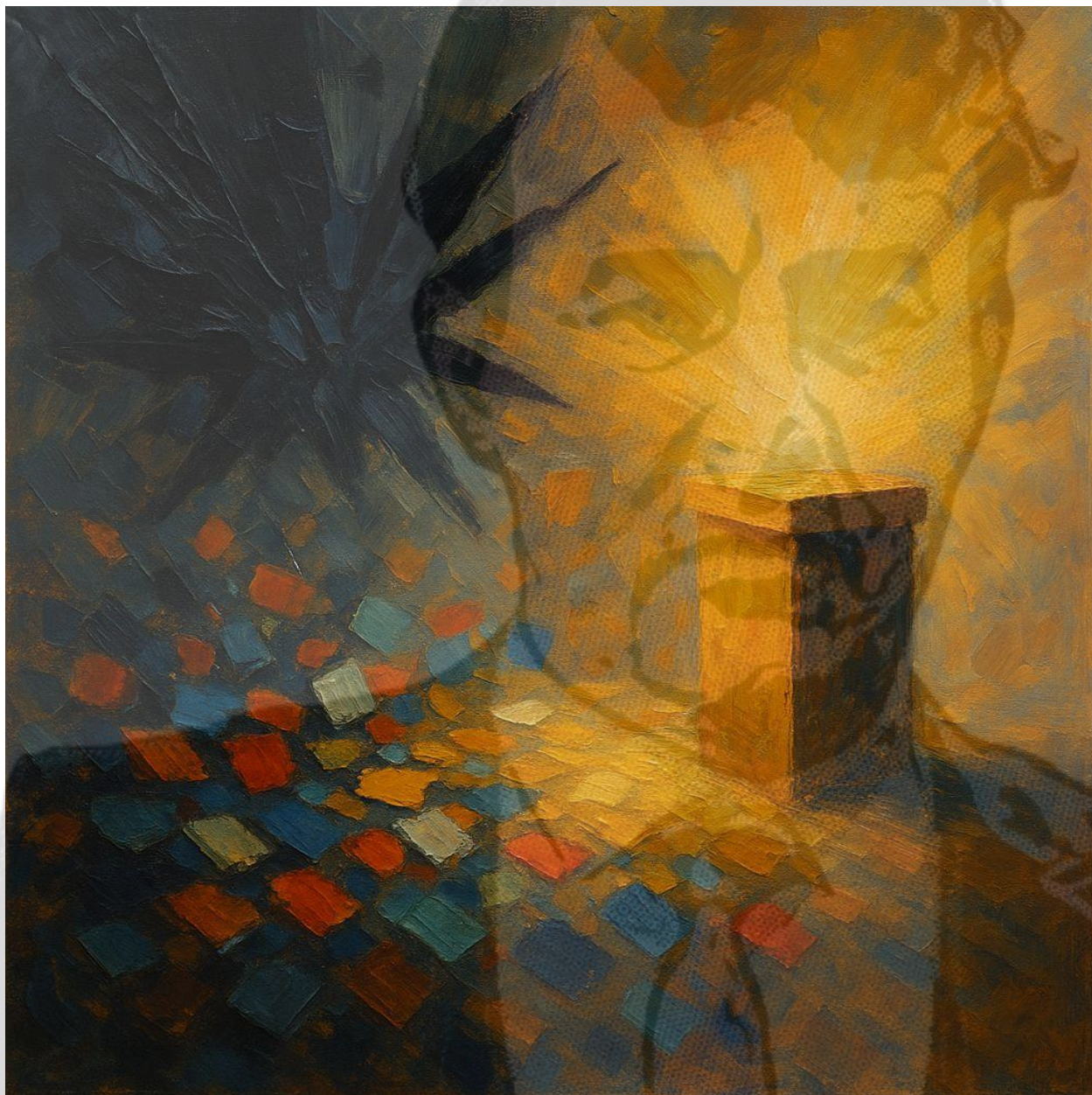




✚ Influence, Mockery, and the Rising Cost of Conviction ✚

 Risk in Proportion to Reach

As Charlie's platform grew, so did the opposition.
This is no coincidence — it is the pattern of public life.

-  Members of Congress now report thousands of threats each year.
-  Pastors and religious leaders face rising hostility both online and in person.
-  Popularity magnifies risk — but protection does not always keep pace.

 Exposure Without Guardrails

Charlie endured the full blaze of media fire.
His convictions drew both followers and fierce critics.

That clip didn't pull the trigger.

No security detail. No shield to match the scale of his influence.

He bore both media fire and physical risk, standing exposed.

 "Strike the shepherd, and the sheep will be scattered." (Zechariah 13:7)

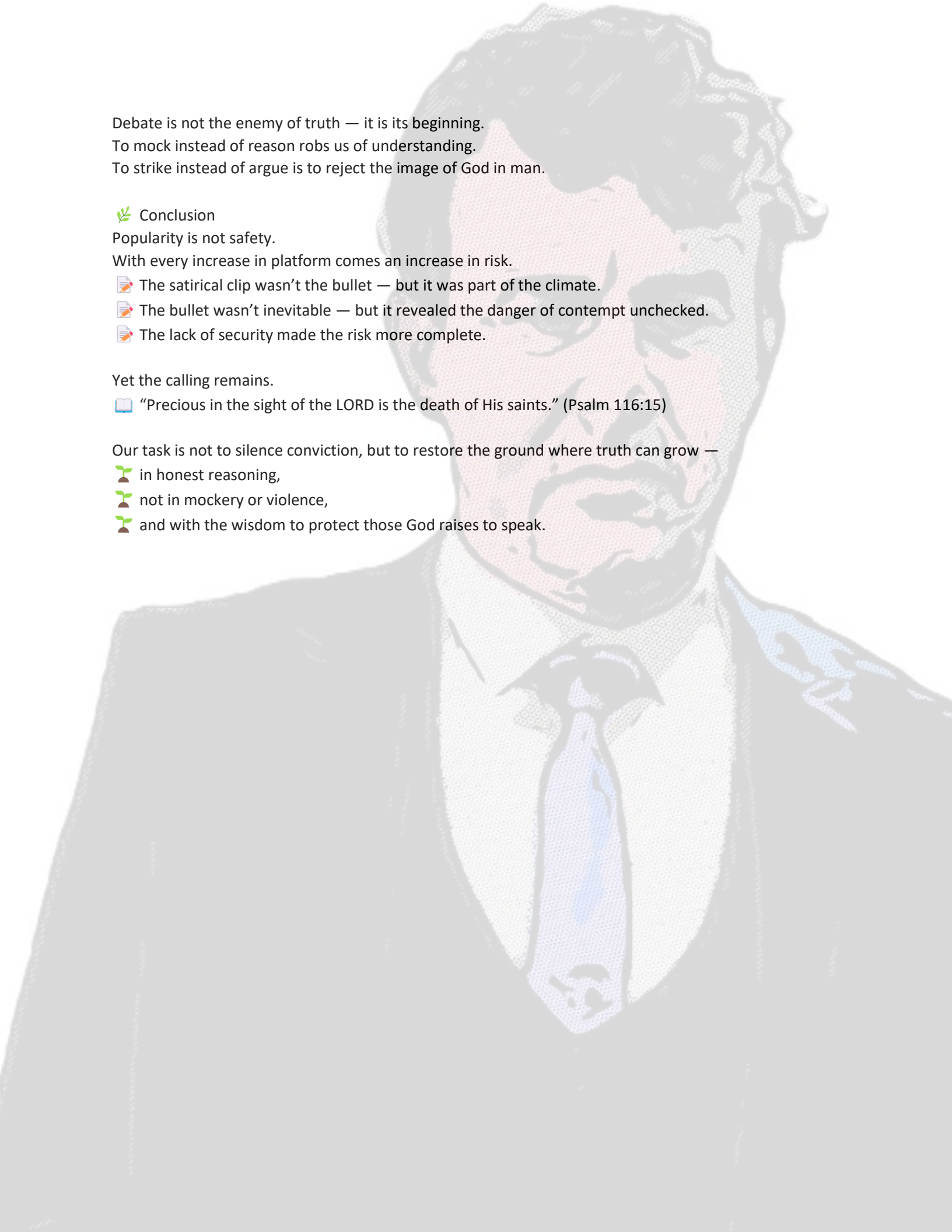
The Hard Questions:
